Overview

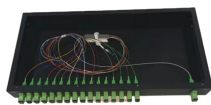
Fiber optic transmission wavelengths are determined by two factors: longer wavelengths in the infrared for lower loss in the glass fiber and at wavelengths which are between the absorption bands. Thus the normal wavelengths are 850, 1300 and 1550 nm. Fiber optic cables use light to transmit data, while traditional cables, such as copper cables, use electrical signals.
